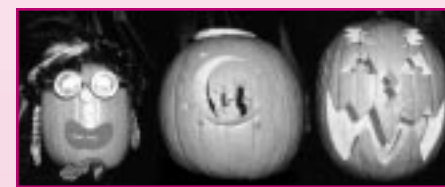

The holidays are fast approaching and the City of San Gabriel is ushering in the season with a number of exciting events for the entire family:



FAMILY HALLOWEEN PUMPKIN-CARVING CONTEST

The Parks and Recreation Department will once again be sponsoring its annual pumpkin-carving contest. This annual contest is for elementary school youth and their families. Individual school contests will be held at the playgrounds on Monday, October 30, with winners advancing to the City Finals at the Recreation Center on Tuesday, October 31. Pumpkins may be entered in the following categories: Best Carved, Most Original, Spookiest, Best Decorated, and Most Humorous.

25th ANNUAL TURKEY TROT

The San Gabriel Parks and Recreation Department is gearing up for its 25th Annual Turkey Trot that will be held Saturday, November 18, at Vincent Lugo Park at the corner of Wells and Ramona in San Gabriel. This fun event, which supports youth activities in the community, will include something for everyone—a 5/10K Race, a Youth 1K Run, and a 5K Fun Walk.

Race highlights include post-race refreshments, free blood pressure screening provided by San Gabriel Valley Medical Center, and a door prize raffle along with the awards ceremony.

Registration begins at 7:15 a.m. with the event starting at 8 a.m. The 5/10K Race First Place winners in each age category will receive a turkey and a medal. The First Place winners in the Youth 1K will receive a medal and a gift certificate to the San Marino Toy and Book Shoppe.

Registration will be accepted at the San Gabriel Recreation Office, 250 S. Mission Drive, Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The race fee for the 5/10K is \$18 with a T-shirt and \$10 without the T-shirt. The Youth 1K and the 5K

Millennium Miles Program Is Underway

Millennium Miles, the most comprehensive street rehabilitation and Pavement Management System (PMS) program in the City’s history, is now underway. For the past three years about \$300,000 was allocated each year for street rehabilitation projects.

Residents and business owners have indicated that street repair and rehabilitation are the community’s top priority. The City Council has approved annual expenditures of \$1 million each year over the

next five years — more than three times the amount previously allocated annually for street repair. Millennium Miles, conducted under the auspices of the Public Works Division, substantially increases the number of street miles sealed, repaired and reconstructed.

Projects include gutter construction, minor sidewalk repairs, curb and drive repairs, pavement rehabilitation and handicap access ramps. Not included are major concrete repairs, parkway tree

planting and street light construction.

“By using local resources and innovative funding approaches, we have been able to more than triple the annual expenditures compared to what has been done in the past,” said City Manager Michael Paules. “We’re using Proposition A funds, state and federal transportation funds, block grants and other sources to improve the condition of our City’s streets.”

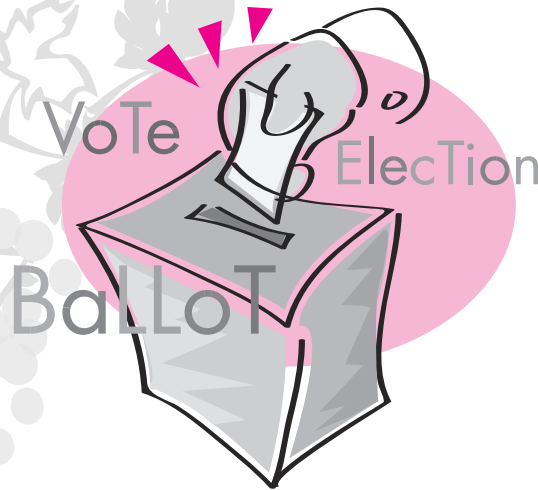

Municipal Election To Be Held March 6

The City will conduct its next general municipal election on Tuesday, March 6, 2001. At that time, voters will elect three members of the City Council, a City Clerk and a City Treasurer. To run for office, candidates must reside in the City of San Gabriel at the time of the pickup, circulation and submission of Nomination Papers that can be done between Monday, November 13 and Friday, December 8, 2000.

If any incumbent fails to file Nomination Papers, the December 8 deadline is automatically extended to Wednesday, December 13, 2000. All elected officials are elected at-large. Candidates wishing to provide constituents with a Candidate's Statement



that appears in the Sample Ballot and Voter Pamphlet must do so at their own

cost. Further, the City of San Gabriel does comply with the Voting Rights Act that requires certain translations that must be available upon request, and the cost of which is also borne by the candidate.

The City is also seeking people who live in Los Angeles County to serve on the various elections boards necessary to conduct the general municipal election. This includes inspectors and clerks at the polling places located throughout the City on Election Day, as well as persons to serve at the Central Counting Center after the close of polls. Polling places are open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

City Gets New Ambulance



On August 25 the City Council unanimously approved the purchase of a modular ambulance. Fire department paramedics will man the \$97,000 Mobile Intensive Care Unit (MICU). The MICU will be based at the headquarters station at Del Mar and Wells Avenues.

The MICU contains state-of-the-art emergency medical equipment. This includes heart defibrillators, piped-in oxygen, backboards, trauma kit and a variety of medications, all designed to assist paramedics in their effort to save lives of patients. The MICU is also equipped with a communications system (including cell phones and two-way radios) that allows paramedics to communicate with the base hospital and receive patient care directions from a doctor.

The larger modular MICU is designed to accommodate additional paramedics for cases like traumatic trauma or heart attacks. Many times those patients may have several paramedics performing life saving techniques simultaneously, while being transported to a hospital.

All of the paramedics who man the MICU are required to undergo over 2,000 hours of rigorous training, consisting of classroom, lab, hospital internship and field internship with experienced paramedics. Paramedics are also required to take various continuous education courses to keep current. These include Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) and Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS).

Study Evaluates Police Facility



The City Council has allocated \$30,000 for a four-month assessment study designed to evaluate the San Gabriel Police Department's 40-year-old facility. The building was originally designed to house 37 employees; it currently has 68 full-time employees plus volunteers and reserves.

"The study examines current operations and needs and will compare that to industry standards to determine where we need to be and what may be required in the future," said Police Chief David Lawton. "Once the study is completed, the results will be presented to the City Council who will determine a course of action."

Smith Park Dedicated

The renovation and expansion of Smith Park have been completed. The new park complements the area's history and its indigenous people, the Gabrielino-Tongva. Landscaping reflects the lifestyle of the Tongva peoples who inhabited the area prior to the establishment of the San Gabriel Mission.

At the recent dedication ceremony, George Kotchnik, Director of Parks and Recreation, described the process of community input, planning and design, financing and construction that resulted in this beautiful park. Mayor Harry Baldwin and Gabrielino-Tongva Tribal Council Representative Mark Acuna spoke about the historical connection the new park has and maintains with the original peoples of this region. Members of the Tribal Council performed a ritual dance of welcome and protection as a blessing for the park.

A featured highlight of the dedication was the unveiling of the hand-painted thematic tile mural that depicts scenes of the Tongva lifestyle. The mural, designed and crafted by San Gabriel Artist Dixie Giering, contains beautiful artifacts, symbols, plants and animals that were important to the native peoples.

The park will be opening for public use after the turf areas are fully and completely established.

San Gabriel's Community Development Department will join thousands of cities nationwide in November when it celebrates World Town Planning Day. Currently celebrated in more than 30 countries on four continents, World Town Planning Day draws attention to the benefits of effective town planning in building healthier, safer and more attractive communities.

City staff is planning an array of exhibits, presentations, and an open house on Tuesday, November 7, from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. at City Hall. Residents can learn about the Alameda Corridor East project, the upcoming General Plan Update, new commercial and economic development opportunities, and a host of other City programs and services.

Holiday Tips from the Police Department

“This holiday season, don't let the spirit of giving burglars, muggers, and pickpockets a better chance to do their dirty work,” says Chief David A. Lawton of the San Gabriel Police Department.

Crooks love the holidays as much as everyone else does, but chiefly because it's an opportune time for crime. Homes jam-packed with glittering gifts. Stores, malls and downtown streets are teeming with unsuspecting shoppers. People rushing around, stressed out and careless, looking for last-minute gifts, trying to get everything done. It's enough to make a crook giddy with holiday joy! Here are some tips from the Crime Prevention Office on how to celebrate safely this holiday season.

IF YOU'RE OUT FOR THE EVENING

1. Turn on lights and a radio or TV so it looks like someone is home.
2. Be extra cautious about locking doors and windows when you leave, even if it's just for a few minutes.
3. Don't display gifts where they can be seen from outside.

IF YOU'RE SHOPPING

1. Stay alert and be aware of what's going on around you.
2. Park in a well-lighted space, and be sure to lock the car, close the windows, and hide shopping bags and gifts in the trunk.
3. Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Pay with a check or credit card whenever possible.

IF A STRANGER COMES TO YOUR DOOR, BEWARE!

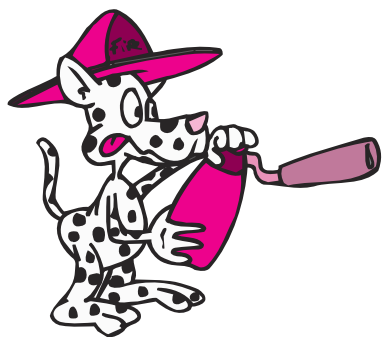
Criminals sometimes pose as couriers delivering gifts. And it's not uncommon for people to try to take advantage of others' generosity during the holidays by going door-to-door for charitable donations when there's no charity involved. Ask for identification, and find out how the funds will be used. If you aren't satisfied, don't give. Help a charitable organization you know and like instead.

PLEASE! DON'T DRINK AND DRIVE

Driving under the influence of alcohol, drugs, or other controlled substances can greatly reduce and impair your ability to respond to daily driving conditions. Impaired drivers are the single greatest threat to motorists today. One out of every two Americans will be involved in an alcohol-related traffic collision during their lifetime. Be a friend for life and serve as a designated driver. We also encourage you to “buckle up” this holiday season. Seatbelts and child restraints save lives.

Last, but not least, don't let holiday stress get the best of your holiday spirit. Make time to get together with family, friends, and neighbors. And think about reaching out in the spirit of the season and helping someone who's less fortunate or lonely.

Do your part to make the holidays a safe and happy time for everybody — except criminals, and Happy Holidays from the men and women of the San Gabriel Police Department!



And More Holiday Tips – from Your Fire Department!

Fire never takes a holiday! Learning basic fire prevention facts and taking simple precautions can make all of your holiday celebrations safe and memorable. This is also a perfect time to find that portable extinguisher and check to see if it needs to be serviced.

HALLOWEEN:

- Costumes and decorations should only be made of flame-retardant materials. Avoid loose, flammable clothing.
- Each mask, wig, and costume must be easily seen at night.
- Use battery powered lights for jack-o-lanterns, not candles.
- Keep decorations away from sources of heat, such as exposed bulbs and open flames.

THANKSGIVING:

- Start holiday cooking with a clean stove and oven.
- Keep kitchen clutter and loose clothing away from the stove's heat.
- Turn pot handles in, away from a child's reach.
- Use potholders to prevent burns.
- Never throw water on a grease fire. Instead, cover the burning pan with a lid.

CHRISTMAS:

- Make sure your Christmas tree is fresh. Shedding needles is a sign of a dry tree.
- Keep your tree fresh by placing it in a stand that holds water.
- Make sure artificial trees are flame-retardant.
- Never smoke around the tree or flammable decorations.
- Place trees away from direct sources of heat.
- Never place a tree so that it blocks an exit.
- Only buy electric lights that are approved by a national testing lab.
- Never decorate metal trees with electric lights.
- Always unplug lights before going to bed.
- Never run electrical cords through doorways and under rugs.
- Keep candles in sturdy holders and never place them near combustibles, such as curtains.
- Avoid hanging stockings near an open flame.
- Never burn paper in a fireplace. This is a major cause of chimney fires.



National Night Out Unites Our Community

National Night Out 2000, held on Tuesday, August 1, is one of the City's most important annual events. National Night Out helps unite our citizens and bring a sense of community. There were 32 block parties citywide, up from 26 from last year, with over 2,500 residents participating. This year's theme was called “Give Crime A Going Away Party.”

crime in the City of San Gabriel. The Police Department's Crime Prevention Office worked closely with Fire, City officials, radio and TV stations, and other dignitaries to coordinate the event. Word-of-mouth, personal contacts and telephone calls to organizations by the Crime Prevention Office helped solicit their participation. This brought together many talented individuals from local

The City currently has 69 “Neighborhood Watch” groups, with approximately 50 percent participating in this year's event. Events ranged from face painting to fingerprinting children. The Crime Prevention Office provided groups with crime prevention handout materials, strobe lights and other promotional items.

In an effort to make the event a success, City staff and citizens worked together by utilizing their specific skills in both the planning and implementation of National Night Out. This once-a-year event encourages our City officials to go out into the neighborhoods and show the citizens that they care about fighting crime and about those they serve.

Because the event is so important, the City Council cancels their regularly scheduled meeting in honor of National Night Out to visit the neighborhoods and support their efforts. In turn, Neighborhood Watch members organize block parties and gather participation from other streets to show that they care about fighting

radio stations, American Red Cross, U. S. Army, U.S. Marine Corps and numerous government dignitaries.

In addition, because of San Gabriel's diverse population, local English, Spanish and Chinese newspaper and television stations covered the event. Press releases were provided to all newspapers and public service announcements were broadcast on the local cable network. Information was published in the Neighborhood Watch newsletter, which is distributed to over 2,500 residents. Event information was provided to 325 local businesses.

Lastly, National Night Out T-shirts were presented by the Police Department to each Neighborhood Watch Block Captain who hosted a block party. Each group was also provided a National Night Out banner promoting the event and the corporate sponsor. There were also certificates of appreciation presented by local government officials to the participating Block Captains.

She received her Bachelor of Science degree in applied management from Azusa Pacific University. School News

SAN GABRIEL UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT

In June 1999, the San Gabriel Unified School District received a \$50,000 Healthy Start Planning Grant from the California Department of Education. The purpose of the planning funds was to target youth and their families at Gabriellino High School, Jefferson Middle School, and the Community Education Center. It involved a collaboration of dedicated community partners and the school district. An in-depth assessment was made to identify existing assets, resources for youth and families, and developing strategies with measurable outcomes.

This resulting strategic plan resulted in a \$400,000 Healthy Start Operational Grant awarded in May 2000 to the District. These funds will be used to establish a "One Stop Shop" Family Resource Center for children and their families. The funds will also provide a referral process for schools, families and access to multiple services that will be provided by the appropriate agencies as determined by the Family Resource Center.

In addition, a two-year, \$50,000 Healthy Start Planning Grant has been awarded to three elementary schools — Washington, Roosevelt, and McKinley. At the end of the two-year planning period, an operational proposal may be submitted to the Department of Education

Rainy Season Brings Out the Con Artists



"With the rainy season almost here, you may notice that your roof may be in need of repairs," states Chief David A. Lawton.

The San Gabriel Police Department would like to alert you that along with the rainy season comes the "con artists." These are people who offer you a "great deal" to handle any repairs, explains Chief Lawton.

Home repair con artists prey on homeowners who desire to get a bargain. A contractor's truck pulls up to the curb and the workman tells you he's just finished a job in the neighborhood and can make you a deal on the price of the repair job because he's got left-over materials that would otherwise go to waste. The most common jobs offered are tree trimming, roof repair and driveway repaving. Not one of the completed

jobs (if ever completed!) is worth the bargain price. The driveway repair, for example, may consist of spraying the driveway with a thin coat of oil. It makes the old asphalt look new, but it washes off in the first rain.

Here are a few tips to avoid being "ripped off":

- Be cautious of people who offer you "free inspections" or who go door-to-door offering home repair services.
- Check the identification of all inspectors.
- Make sure you get a written guarantee on any work that is done.
- Never pay with cash. Before making payments for any work, contact the California State Contractors Board for further information.
- Ask for references and consult the Better Business Bureau.

Lastly, if you have any questions regarding a valid building permit or any information on building contractors, contact the California State Contractors License Board.
