City Receives \$4.6 Million Park Grant

San Gabriel has been awarded \$4.6 million for the proposed Marshall Community Park project, a first-ever joint venture between the City and Garvey School District. The park grant, one of the largest ever received by San Gabriel, will fund the City's first new parkland in more than a decade

The City's project, located at the corner of Jackson Avenue and Norwood Place, was one of only 62 selected from a pool of nearly 500 applications from throughout California. The Office of Grants and Local Services awarded \$184 million for this first round of funding.

San Gabriel was one of the top 15 grant awards

With an average grant amount of approximately \$2.97 million, fewer than 25 percent of grants were awarded in the top range of \$4.6 million. San Gabriel was one of the top 15 grant awards.

The Parks and Recreation Department submitted their proposal in March through the Prop 84 Statewide Park Development and Community Revitalization Program of 2008 for the development of this joint-use space with the Garvey School District.


A series of community meetings were held to design the proposal, which will provide benefits for the community while improving the campus at Marshall Elementary School. The park space will

serve as the school playground during school hours. After school and on weekends the park will be open to the community for recreational activities and family gatherings.


San Gabriel Streetscape Plan Spurs New Business


Streetscape Master Plan will help make San Gabriel Boulevard a magnet for new business development. Prepared by the City's Community Development Department, the preliminary Master Plan (covering the area between Central and Elm Avenues) is also designed to attract pedestrians and bicyclists. It includes seating, lighting, trees, and also shows where proposed medians can be placed, the location of banner poles to enliven the street, and places for public art.

The plan is the first step in improving the overall look and feel of the boulevard. Staff will then seek funding to get the plan elements implemented.

An open house was held on October 14 for City staff to review the Preliminary Streetscape Master Plan. Ideas, issues and concerns were discussed with the landscape architecture consultant, Katherine Spitz Associates. A joint City Council/Redevelopment Agency Study Session was held on December 14 and the Streetscape Master Plan will be presented to the community for input and to the Planning Commission and Design Review Commission

he San Gabriel City Council recently approved two architectural contracts totaling approximately \$2.5 million and in so doing initiated the first steps that could lead to the construction of two new City facilities that will house the Police and Public Works Departments.

Both departments have outgrown their existing facilities, located off Del Mar and Mission. The initial goal of the City Council was to expand the Police Department into a larger facility, keep costs to a minimum and maintain services to the community with minimal impact throughout the construction period.

It was determined this could best be accomplished if Public Works moved from their current location. Consequently, a new Public Works

facility is being considered as a possible option which would be relocated to City owned land on Grand Avenue. After the completion of the new Public Works facility, which is currently budgeted at \$5 million, the former Public Works Department land will be made available for the future construction of a new \$24 million police facility. Upon completion and relocation of police personnel and operations, the old police facility would be converted into a parking lot for the SGPD.

Both departments have outgrown their existing facilities, located off Del Mar and Mission

The City's Finance Department is developing a financing plan to raise additional funds to complete both projects, but would likely require the issuance of bonds and will require the City to pay approximately \$1.5 million per year for annual debt service. More details will be shared with the City Council and community over the next several months, which will include all the normal public noticing, planning commission, and design review processes that are required under law.

Good Lighting Helps Deter Crime

ood lighting is a deterrent to crime whether it is in the home, at play, at work or on the street. Unfortunately, not all streets have street lights. That's why it's important to turn on exterior lighting at night.

A deterrent to any would-be intruder is proper exterior lighting. It helps prevent criminals from concealing their activities. If the yard area is obscured by high shrubbery or other obstacles, exterior lighting is essential as part of your crime prevention plan.

Mounting outdoor yard lights under the eaves of your roof is one of the best locations. If possible, mount them in an out-ofreach location. Illumination from this position makes ground-level assault, whether on you or your residence, more difficult.

When analyzing your lighting needs you should pay particular attention to such areas as exterior doorways, yards, window areas, parking areas, garage areas, hallways, walkways, and blind spots located on and around the premises.

One means of illuminating night blind spots is to add a number of ornamental and functional outdoor lights such as decorative porch and yard post lamps. For added convenience and safety, these yard lights and entrance lights can be equipped with inexpensive timers or photoelectric cells (light sensitive switches), which automatically turn the lights on at dusk and off at dawn.



Garages are a particularly inviting spot for intruders -- be sure to close the garage door every time you leave. Also, have at least one 100-watt bulb positioned on either side of the garage under the eaves.

It is also important to provide ample interior lighting that is properly placed and on timers so that the lights will give the appearance that someone is at home at all hours of the night.

A deterrent to any would-be intruder is proper exterior lighting

Some of the best places for interior lighting are the living room, bedroom and bathroom. These lights should always be used whether you are at home or away. You can use an electric timer or manually turn them on and off. These electric timers plug into your electrical outlet and you then plug your appliance into the timer. You will probably want to use a timer on each floor of your residence to operate your lights. Do this in conjunction with leaving a radio on, which would further give the appearance that someone is home. If the radio is tuned to "talk" stations, this will help confuse a potential burglar. Remember to keep the volume at an appropriate level; not too low and not too loud.

Police Combat DUI Deaths and Injuries : through Traffic Safety Program

🙀 Tamily of four struck and killed by suspected drunk driver," said police. Those are words we hate to hear or read, but are often written in our local newspapers. Sadly, accidents involving drunk drivers almost always leave innocent victims severely or fatally injured. However, many of these tragic accidents can be avoided through preventative measures, which start with you, the motorist.

In 2009, 10,839 people died in highway crashes involving a driver with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08% or higher in the United States. In California, 2009 data shows that 950 people died in alcohol impaired collisions. These staggering figures make drunk driving one of America's deadliest crimes - a crime which could cost you your driver's license, loss of your vehicle, fines and court costs, probation, and jail time.

"All too often, innocent law-abiding people from our community are senselessly injured or killed on our local roadways by impaired drivers and the loss of loved ones due to this careless disregard for human life is unforgivable. Driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs will not be tolerated and is a crime that is completely preventable. Our message is simple and clear. If we find you driving impaired we will arrest you. No exceptions," said San Gabriel Police Chief David A. Lawton.

In the continuing effort to save lives, the San Gabriel Police Department was recently awarded a new \$114,000 traffic safety grant for a year-long anti-DUI program aimed at preventing deaths and injuries on our local roadways.

The enforcement grant will allow adding officers to target impaired driving offenders as well as educate the public on the dangers of impaired driving. This will be done through the use of DUI/driver's license checkpoints, saturation patrols, stakeouts, warrant sweeps, court stings, and through media relations. Funding for this program is from the California Office of Traffic Safety through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Additionally, law enforcement agencies nationwide are asking for the public's continued help by calling 911 if they see a suspected drunk driver. This call to action comes on the heels of good news, with a 7.6 percent reduction of DUI related deaths in California between 2008 and the end of 2009, according to statistics gathered from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's Fatality Analysis Reporting System.

Preventing Door to Door Scams

Scam artists particularly like to target older people who own their own homes and live in middle income neighborhoods. Door-to-door scams are one of the biggest crimes against seniors. Scammers try and sell things like home repair, driveway repair, chimney cleaning, gutter cleaning and tree trimming. Selling door-to-door requires a license in the City of San Gabriel, and home repair companies almost always

Scam artists often try to get paid for their work in cash, but if the victim offers to pay for the work by check, they request that the check be made out to him personally. The scam artist will then cash the check and you'll never see him again.

In another scam, a senior resident agreed to have his

front porch replaced and agreed to pay for materials after the job was started. So the scammer started the job by using a sledge hammer to break up the porch, collected the money to go get materials, but never returned.

Here's another example: the contractor didn't quote an amount to the home owner for cutting down some trees that had come down during a storm. Before the job was finished, they'd left all the cuttings strewn across the yard and handed the woman a bill for \$14,000. She, of course, refused to pay until they threatened to take her property and sue her. Fortunately in this case the woman called relatives, who called the police, and the perpetrators were arrested before they could even cash the check.

Tips to avoid door-to-door scammers

• Don't do business with door to door sales people unless you can verify that they have a local office.

•

- Contractors should always be able to prove that they have a contractor's license. If they say they don't need one for the type of work they do, don't do business with them until you know this for a fact. You can check a contractor's license by going to: www.cslb.ca.gov
- Get references that are at least several months old and call them. Be sure you call the references from your phone.
- Don't do business right on the spot. If someone tells you that you have a problem with your property that needs to be fixed, get additional opinions from several contractors.
- . Don't make the check out in the name of a person, no matter what kind of deal they offer. While the lower price might be a tempting, the risk of a
- Never pay for services in cash. A better option, if the business provides it, is to pay via credit card. Your credit card service will allow you to dispute a charge up to 30 days after the charge is made.
- Before you sign a contract, give it at least a day to think it over. Call friends and relatives and pass the idea by them. Doing so doesn't mean you aren't intelligent. It means that you are cautious and a savvy shopper.
- If you suspect anything, call your local Better Business Bureau or visit www.la.bbb.org/Home.aspx to see if there have been any complaints of this type against this company.

Scammers will often use cheap or inappropriate materials if they do the work at all. One senior reported a scam where the salesperson promised to resurface his asphalt driveway for \$900, which sounded great as he had recently got an estimate elsewhere for \$2,000 for the same job. Not being able to get outside, however, the senior couldn't tell that the scammer had actually spread used motor oil over the asphalt driveway to give it a dark look, rather than resurface it.

Another way scammers convince persons of needed work is to get the names of several neighborhood residents; they then visit other houses to tell them about the supposed work they've done for them, and how much they liked it.

This can be elevated further by providing false names of alleged 'neighbors' that the scammer claims live a few

blocks away. This is another reason why Neighborhood Watch is so important.
